2024 Collections and Evaluation

2024 Collections by Brand

In Connecticut, Thermostat Recycling Corporation (TRC) recovered the equivalent of 1,467 mercury thermostats from 1,103 whole mercury thermostats plus 422 mercury switches removed from thermostats. A total of 2.62 pounds of mercury was diverted from solid waste.

*Please note the explanation of the converted thermostats or thermostat equivalents below.¹ An example of the mercury ampoule is shown below.



As required by the state statute, a table of thermostat brand holders with their corresponding thermostats, the number of switches and the pounds of mercury recycled is below. It is important to note that there remain non-members whose thermostats the TRC collection program recycles. They are listed in the table as "Non-Member Brands".

¹ A mercury thermostat contains a variable amount of mercury ampoules or "switches" attached to the subbase of the thermostat. These glass ampoules often are collected in the recycling container without the intact thermostat attached to them. TRC collects and counts these loose ampoules and recycles them. To derive the converted thermostat or thermostat equivalent, the program takes the following calculations to develop the converted thermostat or thermostat equivalent. First, TRC will count the total whole (intact) thermostats collected in the recycling bins. From these units, there is an intact ampoules count. TRC then takes the intact ampoules divided by the whole (intact) thermostats or otherwise known as the conversion ratio. After the conversion ratio is calculated, TRC will multiple the loose mercury switches by the conversion ratio. Lastly, we add this result to the whole (intact) thermostats to produce the converted thermostats or thermostat equivalents.

Current Collection Locations

Small Pails and Green Bins

In 2024, TRC shipped 73 small pails to collection points around the country. We also shipped 208 new green bins. In comparison, the program shipped 374 new green bins in 2023 and 58 small pails². Collection locations either requested the new pail when they signed up to participate in the program or chose to switch out their bin with a pail due to decreased collections. The large green bins which have been the staple of the program continued to be replenished as they were returned for processing. Because the containers are reused and bar coded, we anticipate that the request for new containers will decrease as the program continues.

• Of the totals provided, TRC shipped one new small pail and one new large bin in the state.

Collection Location Outbound Phone Calls

Our outbound phone calls have been branded internally as the "Miss You Call" process. These calls promote collection container returns and serve as a reminder to locations that have not returned any thermostats. TRC allocates these "miss you calls" to collection sites that have not returned a container in over a year. These calls serve as a friendly customer service check to see if any of the program materials need to be replenished or if missing containers need to be replaced. In total, the program called 1,302 current collection locations in 2024, compared to 1,432 in 2023. The decline in the number of calls completed is a positive sign that more locations were returning a bin without being prompted in 2024, and therefore did not require a "Miss You Call".

 Completed 57 calls to encourage shipping the recycling container compared to 168 a year prior. A copy of the locations called can be found in the Appendix.

² New bin orders coincide with accounts that open new stores, move or lose their existing containers.

Collection Location Postcards

Postcards are sent to all locations that have not returned a container in the past year. These postcards serve as a reminder to locations and assist with updating addresses in the database. In 2024, TRC mailed 9,147 postcards.

Mailed 326 reminder postcards compared to 437 a year prior.

Collection Location Emails

TRC emailed locations three weeks after receiving a postcard to encourage them to directly ship the recycling container. These emails contain step-by-step instructions for shipping and direct contact information for missing shipping labels or further questions. In 2024, TRC emailed 2,380 locations.

 Emailed 82 collection locations three weeks after receiving the reminder postcard to ship their container.

Collection Location Site Visits

Throughout the year, our team completed 387 site visits in numerous states, compared to 426 in 2023. The purpose of site visits is to inform the location of the requirements of participation, what specifically the statute requires of them, assist with shipment of the recycling container, and to answer any questions they may have. We often gather valuable information during the site visit which is used to enhance TRC's outreach and update the database with current contact details.

 Visited 40 collection locations compared to 44 in 2023. A copy of the sites visited can be found in the Appendix.

HVAC Industry

The HVAC industry is comprised of manufacturers, wholesale distributors, and contractors which are intimately involved with the recovery of mercury thermostats. Throughout the year, we engaged with this industry in the following ways.

- Our Banish Mercury Off the Planet (BMOP) Competition, encouraging all HARDI
 wholesalers to compete through collections, ran May 1 through October 31. Throughout
 the competition we sent direct marketing to over 16,500 individual HARDI members.
 - 2024's competition recovered 150 pounds of mercury from more than 300 wholesale branch locations during the contest period.
 - o This year's winners were Johnstone Supply, G.W. Berkheimer, and Design Air.
 - Our top three branches for recycling in the competition:
 - G.W. Berkheimer Co., Inc., Crown Point, IN 4.64 pounds
 - G.W. Berkheimer Co., Inc., Arlington Heights, IL 4.19 pounds
 - South Side Control Supply Co., Morton Grove, IL 4.02 pounds



Waste Related Sector and Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Industry

The waste-related sector remains an important sector for TRC to target individuals and those residents performing DIY thermostat installations. These attempts were to gain new collection locations, form better relationships with the audience and raise overall awareness of the TRC program. As a result of these learnings, TRC took the following actions:

- Used google alerts for HHW events to target phone call or email outreach to encourage them to use the program.
- Presented at the Sustainability in Motion Conference on March 7th in Atlantic City, NJ



Digital Summary

This report summarizes all digital advertising efforts in spreading TRC's message to audience members in Connecticut in 2024 – including search engine optimization (SEO) and digital advertising. Digital advertising included search engine marketing (SEM) ads targeting consumers through Google Performance Max; social media ads targeting consumers through LinkedIn; and programmatic ads targeting consumers through StackAdapt.

Search Engine Optimization

Search Engine Optimization (SEO) is the process whereby a website is optimized through original content and on-site coding tactics to increase its chances of appearing near the top of "organic searches." An organic search is one that appears "naturally" in a search engine like Google or Bing. In other words, an organic listing is not ranked through paid search.

Organic traffic to a website typically brings visitors who stay longer, and visit more pages, on average.

In 2024, organic search traffic for all states (not specific to Connecticut) brought 4,103 users to the TRC website. By comparison, 2,069 users were attributed to organic search over the same time period in 2023.

Search Engine Marketing Ads

As part of search engine marketing (SEM), Google Ads is a digital advertising platform where advertisers can bid on search terms (or keywords) to have informational ads displayed, where ads appear alongside search results. This campaign targets people most likely to be interested in relevant content by driving traffic to various pages on the TRC website. TRC has developed a search campaign to align with terms searched by individuals related to thermostats, mercury, mercury recycling, thermostat replacement, etc.

Quantitative Results

A quantitative summary of SEM ad performance for Connecticut in 2024 is detailed below, with a comparison to 2023.

- Impressions: Number of times ads were served to viewers.
- Clicks: Number of viewers who clicked on ads
- CTR: Click-through-rate, calculated by the number of clicks divided by the number of impressions.
- CPC: Average amount paid for each click.

Social Media and Programmatic Ads

Through social media and programmatic advertising, advertisers can attract large audiences on the platforms they use for social networking and website browsing. This campaign targets people with relevant interests and drives them to various pages on the TRC website. For these ads, audiences on the various platforms were subdivided into various categories, as shown in the quantitative results table below.

Digital Qualitative Analysis

Through paid digital advertising, TRC's various messages were shown nearly over 520,000 times to audience members in Connecticut. Of those over 520,000 times, over 8,000 users were acquired to the website – where 457 conversions occurred. Audience members most likely to take an action from our ads were consumers through Google Performance Max ads. In terms of search engine optimization, organic website traffic doubled from 2023 to 2024.

Thermostat Recycling Corporation's Collection Program in Connecticut

Mercury, a common element in our environment, can pose severe consequences when it infiltrates water systems. It can lead to genetic mutations and developmental problems in animals, as well as damage to the immune and nervous systems in humans. Everyday items such as thermostats may contain small amounts of mercury sealed within a glass bulb. If this containment is breached, the mercury can be released into the environment. Microorganisms can then transform this mercury into highly toxic compounds like methyl mercury, which poses a significant environmental hazard. Although the main contributors to mercury pollution are coal-burning power plants and gold mining, improper disposal of commercial and consumer products containing mercury also contributes to the problem. These can include thermometers, switches, certain light bulbs - including fluorescents - and older thermostats.

In 1998, in light of growing environmental concerns, leading thermostat manufacturers established the Thermostat Recycling Corporation (TRC). As of today, the TRC has participants in 48 states, including 17 that have enforced regulations on the sale and disposal of these thermostats. The TRC's mission is to ensure the safe return and disposal of older, mercury-containing thermostats, hence preventing them from ending up in landfills and incinerators. Furthermore, several states have implemented sales restrictions, disposal bans, and product stewardship statutes for mercury-containing products to prevent mercury from contaminating the environment. Among these states, Connecticut is one of the thirteen that has mandated thermostat manufacturers to provide a secure disposal route for thermostats by implementing an easily accessible take-back program.

This report aims to critically evaluate the effectiveness of the Thermostat Recycling Corporation's (TRC) take-back program in Connecticut, as mandated by Connecticut Public Act No. 12-54. The report provides a comprehensive overview of the program's operations, focusing on aspects such as the accessibility of return channels, their characteristics, and



marketing strategies. Prepared by Resource Recycling Systems (RRS), an independent third party, this evaluation offers an impartial assessment of TRC's success in facilitating a convenient return channel for thermostats removed from service.

Methodology

Receipts for bins and thermostats from the year 2024 were utilized to assess the performance of the TRC collection program in Connecticut. This data was combined with past performance data, encompassing bin and thermostat submission data from Connecticut and all other states where TRC has managed collection programs. The results of the program, based on these data, were scrutinized both for technical precision and for evaluation of program effectiveness.



Connecticut Program Performance

The Thermostat Recycling Corporation (TRC) is a non-profit stewardship organization that facilitates and manages the collection and proper disposal of mercury-containing thermostats. TRC, supported by thermostat manufacturers, provides a network of collection sites around the United States with the aim of keeping mercury out of the waste stream and protecting the environment. The following analytical report details the annual program performance for mercury thermostat collection in the state of Connecticut (CT) in 2024. A few program highlights for 2024 are included below:

- In 2024, the program collected 10.5 lb mercury in Connecticut. Since 2008, mercury collected in the state has increased by an annual average of 12% per year.
 During the same period, the total mercury collected in the nation decreased with an average change of 2.8% per year.
- The program collected **1,103 whole thermostats in 2024**, 31% fewer than the number collected in 2013 at the original implementation of Public Act No. 12-54. In that time, collections have increased by an annual average of 1.8% since 2010.
- The number of **whole thermostats collected per bin in 2024 on average was 37 thermostats**, a slight increase over the average 40 thermostats per bin collected in 2023, and equaling the national average of 37 thermostats per bin.
- Counties returning the most bins and thermostats in 2024 were Hartford (13 bins, 445 thermostats), followed by Fairfield (5 bins, 284 thermostats), New Haven (7 bins, 256 thermostats), and New London (2 bins, 92 thermostats).
- In 2024, **11% of the partner locations returned at least one bin**.
- In 2024, **40** site visits were conducted, and **57** 'Miss You' calls were placed to channel partners to prompt bin returns. 3 sites received both a call and visit.
- In addition to 1,103 whole thermostats, 422 loose switches were collected, bringing the total number of "thermostat equivalents" returned in 2024 to 1,467, nearly an exact match with the 2024 collection rate (1,465 thermostats).



SECTION 1: Program Analytics

Section 1 of this report examines the annual performance of the thermostat collection recycling program in terms of bins, thermostats, and mercury collected as well as the year-over-year progression of the program.


FIGURE 1.1: PROGRAM PERFORMANCE OVER TIME

On average, the program has **collected nearly 17 lb of mercury** and **1,805 thermostats per year** since 2001. In 2024, the program **collected 10.5 lb of mercury from 1,103 whole thermostats and 422 loose switches**. Figure 1.1 displays the number of bins, thermostats, and quantity of mercury collected in Connecticut since the beginning of the program.

Figure 1.2 displays the number of bins collected in Connecticut over time as well as the total number of bins collected nationally over the same period. Annual bin collections peaked nationally in 2015 and in Connecticut in 2017 at 101 bins. Bin collections nationally have declined since 2015, and except for 2016 and 2020, that decline has been steady, though slowing in the past two years. Participation in CT has reflected a similar trend since 2021, with only 30 bins submitted to TRC. This represents the lowest quantity since 2013, a 33% decrease from the previous program year. Nationally, bin collections were down 7% in 2024 relative to 2023.

FIGURE 1.2: BINS COLLECTED OVER TIME IN THE STATE AND NATIONALLY





Since 2008 in Connecticut, the average of year-over-year changes in mercury collection is an increase of 12%. Nationally, during the same period, the average of yearly changes in mercury collected was -2.8%. The quantity of mercury collected across state programs in 2024 was 22% lower than in 2023. In 2024, the quantity of mercury collected in CT remained steady, only decreasing by 2% to 10.5 lb mercury. Figure 1.3 displays the total quantity of mercury collected in Connecticut over time as well as the annual percent increase (or decrease) in Connecticut and nationally since 2008.

Channel partners in Connecticut returned 1,103 thermostats to TRC in 2024. This represents a **24% decrease from 2023**. Since 2010, the average of annual year-over-year changes in thermostats collected in Connecticut is 1.8%, compared to 7% for the 2010-2022 period and 5% for the 2010-2023 period. The yearly change in rates for the U.S. averaged -5.4% over the same period. Figure 1.4 displays the total number of thermostats collected in Connecticut and nationally since 2010.

Figure 1.6 displays the monthly distribution of bins and thermostats returned in Connecticut over 2024. The month with the greatest number of bins returned was March (10 bins), followed by four months collecting three bins including February, May, September and October. March also brought in the most thermostats (399 thermostats) followed by October (153 thermostats). The next three most productive months include January, April and August; for each of those months, thermostats were delivered in either one or two bins. November and December were the only months during which no bins were collected.

FIGURE 1.6: WHOLE THERMOSTATS AND BINS COLLECTED PER MONTH IN 2024






Figure 1.7 shows the average number of thermostats per returned bin per month for the year. The highest number of thermostats per bin, on average, was in **August (98 thermostats per bin)**, followed by **January (67 thermostats per bin) and April (66 thermostats per bin)**.

FIGURE 1.7: AVERAGE THERMOSTATS PER BIN RETURNED PER MONTH






Figure 1.8 displays the average number of thermostats returned per bin in the state and U.S. since 2010 in Connecticut. Nationally, the number of thermostats collected per returned bin has steadily decreased over a longer timeframe but effectively leveled off in recent years. The rate was 37 thermostats per bin across all programs nationally in 2024. In Connecticut, the average number of thermostats per bin collected in 2024 increased from the 2023 rate of 32 thermostats per bin to equal the national average at **37 thermostats per bin**.

FIGURE 1.8: AVERAGE THERMOSTATS PER BIN OVER TIME IN CT AND NATIONALLY






Figure 1.9 depicts the correlation between the total bins returned and the average number of thermostats per bin over time. The long-term data suggests a strong negative correlation, indicating that as the total bin count rises, the average number of thermostats per bin declines. However, this pattern does not appear to be consistent over shorter durations. In the period between 2014 and 2023, there is no significant correlation. From 2019 to 2023, a strong positive correlation was exhibited with the number of collected bins and the average number of thermostats per bin fluctuating in a similar pattern year over year. This trend did not hold in 2024, however, as the number of bins returned declined while the average number of thermostats per bin increased.

SECTION 2: Channel Partner Analysis

In Section 2 of the report, an extensive analysis of the partner locations is conducted. The majority of thermostats collected within the state were procured from **wholesalers**, **which accounted for 70%**, **or 778 units**. Following the broader collection decline trend, this quantity represents the lowest quantity collected from wholesalers in recent years.

Contractors supplied 20% of the total at 219 thermostats, also representing the group's lowest contribution in recent years. Hazardous household waste facilities (HHW)

contributed 10% (106 units). As in 2023, no thermostats were collected from retailers in 2024. Figure 2.1 depicts the distribution of thermostats collected by location type in 2024.

FIGURE 2.1: THERMOSTATS COLLECTED BY CHANNEL PARTNER TYPE IN 2024







Figure 2.2 below displays the change in the number of bins returned by thermostat collection type over time since 2013 in Connecticut. In 2024, **Contractors returned 6 bins**, and **HHW returned only 3**. **Connecticut wholesalers only returned 21 bins** to TRC, the fewest number of bins TRC has received from wholesale channel partners since the program originated.

In 2024, **30 (11%) locations** with a bin in the state of Connecticut sent back a bin to TRC, and each of these locations returned only a single bin. The distribution is displayed in Figure 2.3.

In 2024, Hartford (13 bins and 445 thermostats) again returned the greatest number of thermostats, narrowly exceeding those returned from Fairfield (5 bins, 284 thermostats), New Haven (7 bins, 256 thermostats), and New London (2 bins, 92 thermostats). Figure 2.4 displays the number of bins and thermostats returned by county in 2024.

TRC works with channel partners to collect thermostats, and the following figures illustrate performance by partner. R.E. Michel Co (178 thermostats) returned the most thermostats in 2024, followed by Plimpton & Hills Corp (170 thermostats) and Star Supply



Company (105 thermostats). Other companies that returned significant numbers of thermostats include Servco Oil Company, Southeast Connecticut Regional Resources Recovery Authority, Johnstone Supply and Glasco Heating amongst others. Figure 2.5 displays the top performing partners by total bins returned in 2024.





To enhance engagement, TRC visited collection locations that might have been inactive in recent program years. In 2024, a total of 40 site visits were executed, and 57 'miss you' calls were made to 94 locations. Consistent with the timing of prior years, site visits in 2024 took place in March. Figure 2.7 represents the correlation between the number of site visits per month, bins returned per month, and the quantity of thermostats returned per month (represented in 100s). The site visits in March coincided with the highest rate of bin returns during the year. Out of the 37 locations that were visited and not called, 12 (32%) returned a bin. Only 3 locations received a call and a visit, with only one (33%) of those locations returning a bin. Ten bins were returned in March, while three bins were returned in each month including February, May, September, and October.

FIGURE 2.7: RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN SITE VISITS AND BINS AND THERMOSTATS RETURNED PER MONTH




Figure 2.8 illustrates the correlation between the monthly frequency of calls, the quantity of bins returned, and the number of thermostats returned (scaled by hundreds) per month. In 2024, all 57 calls were made in the month of March. As seen from Figure 2.8, the return of



bins in March exceeded returns of any other month, with a maximum of three bins returned in other months. Of the 54 locations that received a call but no visit, only 3 (6%) returned a bin, and one of three locations receiving a visit and a call returned a bin. So, of the 57 locations that received a call, only 7% returned a bin, suggesting calls had, at most, a low-level impact on motivating channel partners to submit thermostat-containing bins to TRC.






Figure 2.9 compares the return rates of four different groups: locations that did not receive a call or visit, locations that received a visit, locations that received at least one call, and locations that received both. It is evident from the data that visits have a substantially greater impact on return rates compared to calls. Locations that received only a call had a mere 6% active participation rate, significantly lower than the 13.5% rate for locations that didn't receive either a visit or a call. This discrepancy can be largely attributed to the targeting of calls to sites with historically low participation rates. In contrast, locations that were visited exhibited a robust participation rate of 33% and contributed to a markedly higher number of returned thermostats compared to locations that were not visited.

SECTION 3: Comparisons to National and Other States' Data

In order to evaluate the performance of collection partners in 2024, a comparison was drawn between the national and state averages of returned bins per location since 2012. This average was calculated exclusively from locations that returned at least one bin within a given year, excluding those that did not return any. The unique return patterns that are influenced by varying state regulations, housing types, local policies, and incentives should be considered when making these comparisons. In 2024, Connecticut's annual average of returned bins per participating location continued to fall farther below the U.S. average, continuing a decline that has trended over the previous three years.

FIGURE 3.1: AVERAGE NUMBER OF BINS RETURNED PER LOCATION PER YEAR






Figure 3.2 displays the locations in Connecticut that returned more than one bin each year since 2020. Plimpton & Hills Corp. returned the most bins in 2024 with five, followed by R.E. Michel Co which returned three, followed by Johnstone Supply and the Granit Group, both of whom returned two in 2024.

Figure 3.4 displays total percentage of locations that actively participated in the program (active participation defined as sending back at least one bin) in 2024, for all the states where statewide recycling program have been mandated as well as the U.S. national average for all states (reporting and non-reporting). **In 2024, 11% of locations in Connecticut returned at least one bin,** a fraction of a percent below the average of locations across all state programs. Rhode Island again had the highest participation rate, with the largest proportion of locations returning a bin in 2024 (31%).

FIGURE 3.4: MANDATORY REPORTING STATES' PERCENTAGE OF LOCATIONS RETURNING A BIN IN 2024






Figure 3.5 presents a comparison between state and national analytics for selected categories in 2024. The categories under comparison include: total collection of thermostats, bins, and loose switches; the number of thermostats collected from all locations and from actively participating locations; the average number of thermostats per returned bin in 2024; the equivalent average; the number of returned mercury thermostat equivalents; and the percent change in mercury thermostat equivalents from 2023 to 2024. The equivalent average is calculated based on the average number of switches in the collected whole thermostats in the state, and it is used to compute the number of thermostats represented by returned loose switches. The thermostat equivalent number sums up the total number of returned whole thermostats combined with the equivalent number of thermostats represented by the collected loose mercury switches. The states included in the comparison are those that require reporting, with the average calculated for all regulated states that return bins, both reporting and non-reporting.

For comparing state and national data, Figure 3.6 illustrates the ranking of each state in various categories, from highest to lowest. Similar to Figure 3.5, the states included in Figure 3.6 are those required to report thermostat returns. The average represents all states that return bins, encompassing both reporting and non-reporting states. Connecticut's collections of bins, whole thermostats and loose switches were lower than the average amongst the states shown, and metrics such as thermostats collected per bin returned and per participating location were also lower than the average of regulated states. Collection in terms of thermostat equivalents remained similar to 2023, only increasing by an estimated two equivalents, while the average change across the included states decreased by 17% over the same timeframe.

Figure 3.7 below shows the quantity of mercury collected through TRC's program in Connecticut and neighboring states between 2018 and 2024. The quantity of mercury collected in 2024 was low at 10.52 lb, remaining close to amounts collected in the previous program year (10.68 pounds). Vermont also collected a relatively similar quantity to its 2023 program, while Massachusetts was the only state with a significant decrease in quantity of mercury collected. The other state programs each collected more mercury in 2024 than in 2023, with New Hampshire's program showing the highest increase year-over-year.

FIGURE 3.7: MERCURY COLLECTION RELATIVE TO PEER NEW ENGLAND STATES







Figure 3.8 presents the thermostat collection trends in comparison with other New England states from 2018 to 2024. The 2024 program in Connecticut collected 1,103 thermostats, declining 24% over the previous program year. This decline in year over year collections continues the similar trend seen in each of the previous three program years. Programs in New Hampshire and Vermont Collected relatively similar quantities of thermostats relative to 2023 programs, While Maine and Rhode Island programs collected more thermostats in 2024 than in 2023. The Massachusetts program collected far fewer thermostats in 2024 than in 2023 and any preceding year since 2018, though collections continued to exceed that of other peer New England programs in 2024.

The two metrics that gauge participation in the program - thermostat collections and bin returns - share a relationship. The parallel annual trends and visual rates of change for these two metrics are illustrated in Figure 3.9. In 2024, bin returns in Connecticut dropped 33% in the program year to only 30 bins; this decline continued a decline trend in recent years, effectively diminishing participation to only half of what the program realized in 2021. Thermostat collections have also recently diminished annually, and by 59% relative to the 2021 program year.

CT Thermostats Returned vs Bins Returned






Figure 3.10 below provides a clear graphical representation of the average number of thermostats per bin by New England state programs since 2018. It shows the correlation between the increase in returned bins and the rise in returned thermostats. Among the states displayed, only Connecticut saw an increase in the average number of thermostats collected in bins compared to levels in 2023. Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont programs remained constant for this metric, however, with rates declining in Rhode Island and Massachusetts compared to the previous program year.

Conclusions

Results in Year 10 under the Mandatory TRC Program in Connecticut

Based on an analysis of the TRC's collection program in Connecticut in 2024, and looking at comparative data from other state programs, several observations can be drawn about the Connecticut program in terms of performance.

The participation rate amongst channel partners showed a sharp downward trend in 2024, signaling a possible decline in engagement as evidenced by the sharp decrease in bin returns, which fell by 33% to just 30 bins in 2024, half of the 2021 return rate. With only 11% of total state locations returning a bin in 2024, the state's program participation was on par amongst all state programs and among the lower participation rates amongst those that have implemented a mandatory collection program; of these, several have maintained a considerably higher rate of channel partner participation, such as Rhode Island's program that led in 2024 with a 31% participation rate.

Collection metrics were mixed with 1,103 whole thermostats and 422 loose switches collected for a total of 1,467 thermostat equivalents. These results were nearly identical to the 2023 program, though collections of bins and overall whole thermostats showed a significant decline from 2023, as well as the average annual collection of 2,254 thermostats seen over the previous six years since 2018. The average 37 thermostats per bin, while higher than some peer states, suggests moderate efficiency in collection density. Mercury collection remained stable at 10.52 pounds, only a slight decrease from 2023's program that captured 10.68 pounds.

Connecticut's program experienced a 24% decline in thermostat collection, and in comparison to neighboring New England states, brough in fewer thermostats than any state but New Hampshire, which, along with Rhode Island, showed an increase in collection rates. This continues a trend observed over the past three program years. Massachusetts, despite showing decreased collections in 2024, still maintained higher overall collection numbers than other New England states.



Continuing the pattern seen previously, collection concentration was focused within three counties at 83% of the total. Four key channel partners, including R.E. Michel Co, Plimpton & Hills Corp, Star Supply Company, and Servco Oil Company together provided 50% of the thermostats collected in 2024. This concentration of activity among a few major participants represents a continued trend that was similarly reflected in the 2023 program.

The analysis looked at the correlation between bin returns and thermostat collections, a metric that demonstrates the program's fundamental challenge. The decline in both since 2021 saw thermostat collections drop 59% and bin returns by 50%. At the same time, despite overall declining participation, the program's efficiency metrics may reveal some positive signals for opportunity in the program if capture is a meaningful contributor to the decline. For example, the increase in average number of thermostats collected per bin compared to 2023 levels is unique among New England states where this metric either remained constant (Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont) or declined (Rhode Island and Massachusetts). While this efficiency improvement does not offset the significant reduction in overall participation and subsequent collection volumes, it may indicate that the impact of participation may be outsized in terms of program results, and the downward trend in collection of thermostats and mercury may have potential to reverse if participation numbers can rebound in 2025.

Engagement tactics included phone calls and site visits directed by TRC in an effort to remind programs to participate. Site visits continued to prove significantly more successful than phone calls; visited locations showed a 32% return rate compared to 6% for phone calls. This suggests that direct, in-person engagement remains a vital tool for getting partners to mail in bins. Locations that did not receive any formal outreach still contributed significantly to overall collections, however, with 14% of these locations returning a bin.

The contrast with some neighboring state programs, particularly Rhode Island with its consistently high participation rates, implies there might be a possibility for program enhancement strategies in Connecticut that could be achieved with targeted interventions that address declining participation while maintaining the program's operational



efficiencies. The success of neighboring states as measured by certain metrics provides valuable benchmarks and potential best practices that could inform program improvements in Connecticut.

The widespread decline in collection rates both in Connecticut and more broadly is surely attributable in part to the natural reduction in serviceable mercury-containing thermostats. As more time passes since sales of these thermostats were phased out, it would be expected that fewer units are subsequently being removed from buildings. Information that would facilitate an evaluation of the relative role this factor plays in comparison to other program factors such as channel partner engagement, training and education, etc. is unknown, but information that could enable that question to be answered might include statistics on the fraction of removed thermostats that contain mercury, as well as how quickly this proportion changing over time. In the absence of this type of information, emphasis should continue be given to the measures that are known to drive participation including active education and engagement with upstream channel partners to prompt participation directly with bin suppliers and also with their upstream channel partners.

HOW MERCURY THERMOSTAT WASTE IS HANDLED

WASTE MERCURY-ADDED THERMOSTAT MANAGEMENT THROUGH VEOLIA ES TECHNICAL SOLUTIONS, LLC.

TRC containers with waste mercury-switch thermostats are received at a fulfillment/inventory center in Port Washington, Wisconsin (WIR000130591). The facility is owned and operated by Veolia ES Technical Solutions, L.L.C. (Veolia) under contract with TRC.

All recycling containers, including pails and bins are received at the loading dock and sent to the TRC inventory room. The container and plastic liner are opened and the contents are identified, sorted, and tallied. The following data is recorded for each bin returned and processed: bin number, business name (location name), city, state, zip code, date returned, number of thermostats and mercury switches by manufacturer and any non-conforming material.

The containers are returned to the location that sent it in with a new prepaid address label within 3 weeks of receipt. The thermostats are stored and staged in a plastic lined carton in a storage area for final processing. The containers are dated and processed in order received, first in-first out.

The thermostats and any loose bulbs collected from the containers are consolidated into a special 55-gallon drum which is labeled and dated according to regulations. The drum is sealed with a band and is only opened when contents are being added to it. Special negative pressure venting assures any fumes are captured and vented when the drum is opened.

The 55-gallon drum is then shipped to Veolia's mercury recovery facility (WID988566543) for final processing of the mercury ampules (switches). Veolia Environmental Services meets or exceeds all local, state, federal and EPA regulations for the management of the product.

The containers are returned from the storage area to the mercury recovery processing area to have the mercury bulbs removed from the plastic housing. Universal Waste Regulations require the recycling and disposal of waste within 12 months of acceptance at the processing facility.

Small quantities of thermostats are removed from the container, which is then closed again. The bulbs are removed from the thermostats and placed into processing vessel at the work station. Once the processing vessel is full, the vessel is loaded into the mercury recovery retort oven.

If a bulb breaks and the mercury spills, the work area is designed to contain the spillage and the operators are trained in the clean-up and disposal of mercury. The TRC inventory

and processing areas are equipped with special mercury vacuum cleaners and the work area is vacuumed at the end of the work day to ensure that any spillage is cleaned up and not left to evaporate.

Veolia meets or exceeds all local, state, federal and EPA regulations for the management of the product. The mercury recovery facility and process are permitted by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. Veolia's approvals for mercury recovery/recycling include:

- EPA identification WID988566543
- Hazardous Waste Storage License #6008
- Hazardous Waste Treatment License (Mercury Recovery Operations) #4585
- Air Operation Permit #246076050-S01
- Storm Water General Permit #WI-S067857-4

In addition to the regulatory permits, both Veolia Port Washington facilities have developed and maintain management systems in accordance with ISO 14001-2004, OHSAS 18001-2007, and Responsible Recycling (R2:2013) Practice. All persons who handle mercury thermostats as part of the TRC operation receive training in the handling of Hazardous Waste and Universal Waste.

The mercury containing ampules are retorted at Veolia's Port Washington Mineral Springs facility. The mercury is removed during the retort process. The post retort debris consists of broken glass ampules. The debris is tested for residual mercury to document the removal of the mercury to levels below the US EPA Land Disposal Restriction (LDR) levels. The debris is then disposal of as a non-hazardous solid waste at Advanced Disposal Glacier Ridge Landfill, LLC in Horicon, Wisconsin.
